Heart Failure in Pregnancy



Have you ever heard of a pregnancy complication where healthy women develop heart failure suddenly? Peripartum Cardiomyopathy (PPCM) is a disease where women develop heart failure during pregnancy or after giving birth. If left untreated, PPCM can lead to stroke, heart attack, permanent disability

A woman may initially exert one or more of the following symptoms, and it is easy to see why so many women have their symptoms dismissed as normal signs of pregnancy. It is estimated that PPCM occurs in 1 in 2000-4000 births. Early diagnosis generally leads to full recovery of heart function.





Symptoms include:

- Difficulty breathing while lying flat
- Shortness of breath on exertion or extreme tiredness
- Swelling (edema) above and below the knees
- Palpitations awareness of heart beating
- Cough and/or pink sputum
